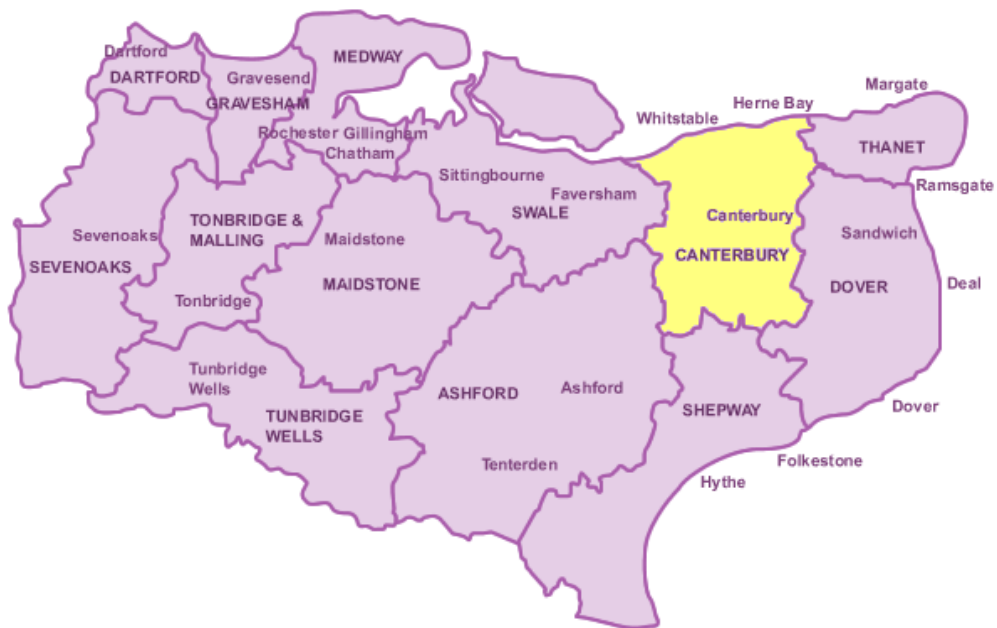


## Canterbury, Whitstable & Herne Bay

## ***Did you know that....??***

**Canterbury is a UNESCO World Heritage Site, featuring a castle; five museums and the Canterbury Tales attraction that lets you step back in time to the Middle Ages!**

- The town was abandoned at the end of the Roman period, only to be resettled by the Saxons. The name Canterbury derives from the Old English *Cantwarebyrig*, meaning "fortress of the men of Kent".
- The Cathedral, St Augustine's Abbey and St Martins church form the trio of World Heritage Sites in Canterbury. The Abbey was founded in 597AD, while St Martin's Church is the oldest parish church in England still in constant use.
- The Cathedral's history goes back to 597AD when St Augustine, sent by Pope Gregory the Great as a missionary, established his seat (or 'Cathedra') in Canterbury. The cathedral was the scene of the murder of Thomas Becket in 1170. As a result of this event, Canterbury became a major pilgrimage site, and later for a short time it was the royal burial site to King Henry IV and Edward the Black Prince. Its pilgrimage site status inspired Geoffrey Chaucer to write *The Canterbury Tales* in 1387 and routes such as that from Southwark and the Pilgrim's Way converged on it.
- Goodnestone Park Gardens, near Canterbury is the location that in 1796, Jane Austen began writing the novel *Pride and Prejudice*. Goodnestone Gardens is a popular visitor attraction offering 14 acres of 18<sup>th</sup>-century parkland as well as traditional rose gardens.
- During the 18th century Canterbury was a quiet market town although it did have a flourishing leather industry and paper making industry. The first railway links to Canterbury was also build during this time.
- Later during World War II 115 people were killed by German bombs. The worst raid was in 1942. During it 48 people were killed and part of the town centre was destroyed, including the Cathedral.
- Mary Tourtel, the English artist who created Rupert Bear, was born in Canterbury and lived in Ivy Lane for much of her life, the house is still visible today. She died in 1948 and was also buried in the famous St Martin's Churchyard.
- Today it is one of the most beautiful and historic cities in England. The medieval city centre bustles with high street shops as well as exclusive boutiques, while the picturesque side streets are home to smaller specialist shops, pubs and restaurants.

## **Coastal Towns:**

**Whitstable** has a rich maritime history and is famous for its oysters, with once a working harbour. Known as the "Pearl of Kent", Whitstable is famous for its oysters, which have been collected in the area since at least Roman times. Today freshly caught shellfish are available throughout the year at several seafood restaurants and pubs in the town.

**Herne Bay** was founded in the early nineteen hundreds and was a popular holiday destination for Londoners. It was during this period that a wealthy London lady gave the town its distinctive 80ft Clock Tower. The first pier was erected in 1832, followed by steamboats in 1834. In World War II the bouncing bomb, was tested off the shore near here. One of the prototype bombs may be seen in the Herne Bay Museum today.

## Local Villages:

**Bishopsbourne** this small village lies in the Nailbourne valley four miles from Canterbury and about fifteen miles from Dover. Its history ranges from a pub named The Mermaid which was built in 1861, to the St Mary's church with 14th century wall paintings. Author Joseph Conrad lived here and his house, "Oswalds", still stands.

**Fordwich** is said to be the smallest town in England, with a population of around 300 people it lies on the River Stour, northeast of Canterbury. The town grew in the middle ages as a port of Canterbury. The town lost its status in 1880 when it no longer had a major and corporation. However in 1972 the sleepy town of Fordwich was again given Town status.

**Chartham** village is 4 miles west of Canterbury, located on the River Stour which once provided the power for the paper mills. The church of St Mary the Virgin, built in approximately 1294, is located next to the village green and is remarkable for containing the oldest peal of bells in Kent.

**Sturry** is a small village on the River Great Stour three miles north-east of Canterbury. It lies at the old Roman junction of the road from the city to Thanet and Reculver at the point where a fort was built to protect the crossing of the river.

**Elham** (pronounced Eel-um) village situated approximately 9 miles south of Canterbury. The village shares a rich history ranging from the Anglo Saxon period to Roman remains being discovered. Elham village square still features a shop and post office. Just outside the parish is the Elham Valley Vineyard.

## Countryside:

**Canterbury's countryside is rich in charming villages, glorious countryside and traditional seaside towns.**

**Reculver Country Park** offers lovely walks from Bishopstone to the ruins of a Roman fort and Saxon church. There is also an Information Centre which offers a fascinating insight into the history and wildlife of this stretch of coastline. The Park is a renowned spot for watching migrating birds and is situated on the north Kent coast 3 miles east of Herne Bay.

**Stodmarsh National Nature Reserve** covers 241 hectares of diverse landscape comprising reed beds, grazing marsh and lagoons. There are several bird habitats located on the reserve and numerous footpaths, including The Stour Valley Walk and the Saxon Shore Way walking routes.

**Grove Ferry** is an ideal spot for picnicking in the meadows, or fishing in the River Stour. Fishing rights were granted during the reign of Henry II and are still available today. It is a good base for following the Stour Valley Walk, the Saxon Shore Way or the Wantsum Walks, and is adjacent to Stodmarsh National Reserve. During the summer months you can also take a boat trip on the River Stour from the Grove Ferry Inn.

**Blean Woods** has a wealth of wildlife for you to discover. The 180-year-old oakwood supports three species of woodpecker. In summer the wide rides and sunny glades are alive with butterflies and other insects.

## Cycling Routes:

**The Crab and Winkle Way** is a terrific 7.5 mile (12km) mainly traffic-free route between Canterbury and Whitstable. Once the old Canterbury to Whitstable railway line now forms part of the National Cycle Network Route 1.

**The 'Coast to Cathedral' route** is a marvellous 50 mile (80km), circular ride on Regional Routes 16 and 17 linking Dover, Folkestone and Canterbury. The ride is blessed with leafy lanes and bridleways, rolling hills and country villages.

The Oyster Bay Trail is a coastal cycle route between Reculver and Whitstable. It is one of the city council's high priority cycle route schemes (as set out in our Walking & Cycling Strategy 2003) as it is a missing link in the coastal national and regional cycle route network in Kent.

## Walking Routes:

**Canterbury Accessible Heritage Trail** is suitable for wheelchairs, which takes you along the City Wall via Dane John Gardens, up Castle Street to the Norman Castle and into the city to the Cathedral and the Westgate Gardens. It is available in leaflet form from the Canterbury Information Centre. The leaflet includes a map with a detailed route and several points of interests, such as the City Walls, the Norman Castle and the Cathedral.

**Chartham North Downs Way Lost Landscapes Heritage Trail** is 6.4 miles along the River Stour and on through ancient woodland and the Chartham Downs, through Britain's first orchard nature reserve. The spectacular views and prehistoric heritage make it a beautiful and interesting walk.

**Elham Valley Way** is a 22.5 mile walk through the Kent Downs. Starting from the historic cathedral city of Canterbury and finishing at the coastal town of Hythe, the route gives walkers the chance to experience the diverse landscape of downland, woodland and farmland.

**Fordwich Village to Reed Pond Walk** is a 2.4 mile walk passing through the land owned by the ministry of defence. Reed pond is the focal point of the walk where it was once used to supply the monks of Canterbury Cathedral with water.

**Minnis Bay to Reculver Country Park** is a linear walk of 3.7 miles one-way, or 7.4 miles returning to the start. This lovely sea walk offers plenty to see as you pass a salt water lagoon, a working oyster farm and the Reculver Towers and fort.

**The Stour Valley Walk** is a 51.5miles route starting from the source of the River Stour at Lenham to the sea at Pegwell Bay near Sandwich. This long distance linear walk offers a varied landscape and can be broken down into shorter walks, with sections of the route passing through Canterbury.

**Grove Ferry to Plucks Gutter Walk** is a great place for an entire day out as there is the picnic site surrounded by marshland. The Little Stour River that joins the Great Stour at Plucks Gutter allows visitors to continue their walk along the Saxon Shore Way for another 7 miles from Plucks Gutter to Sandwich.

**Stodmarsh National Nature Reserve Walk Grove Ferry** is a short walk, 1.25 miles over the reserve area that used to be naturally flooded. The walk offers views over Feast's lake and the local wildlife. Stodmarsh national nature reserve also features its own short walk, 0.6 miles around the marshlands, lakes and wet woodlands.

## Tourism Figures: Key headline figures for Canterbury for 2006

- It is estimated that around 596,430 overnight tourism staying trips were made to Canterbury in 2006. Staying a total of 2,460,639 nights. Of this, domestic visitors made 76% of trips (451,120) and overseas visitors made 24% of trips (145,310).
- £105,814,998 spent by staying visitors on their trip
- It is estimated that around 5.8 million tourism day trips were made, generating a further £198,012,456 trip expenditure.
- In total, around £304,760,229 was spent on trips to Canterbury in 2006 by staying and day visitors. 18% of this expenditure was made by domestic staying visitors; 17% by overseas staying visitors and 65% by day visitors.
- In addition, expenditure by friends and relatives on visitors, and visitors spend on second homes (i.e. maintenance) generates a further £11,534,000.
- With the addition of other expenditure tourism activity generated £315,361,454 expenditure.
- Of this expenditure, £298,905,000 translates into direct income for local business; and a further £59,781,000 of income is generated through indirect and induced effects (a total of £358,686,000 business turnover.)
- This income supported 5,393 FTE jobs and 7,376 Actual jobs
