Shepway Key Facts

History

- Shepway is named after the Saxon “lathe” of Shepway; the Royal Court of Shepway, which met near Lympe at a place called *Shepway Cross*, and was the principal court of the Cinque Ports Federation.
- The district has been settled since pre-historic times and ancient burial mounds can still be found on the downs north of Folkestone and Hythe.
- Folkestone’s East Cliff was the location for an important Roman Villa and the remains of a Roman Fort – Portus Lemanis - can still be seen at between Lympe Castle and the Royal Military Canal
- The 100 square miles of the Romney Marsh was originally part of a wide and shallow bay with the sea coming up to the base of the Lympe escarpment and the area has been created over the centuries by a mix of natural events and reclamation works
- In Saxon times (650AD) St. Eanswythe founded a nunnery in the area now known as “The Bayle” in Folkestone’s old town – her bones were discovered in Victorian times at the 12th century church of St. Mary and St Eanswythe’s and are still held there
- Hythe and Romney were founder members of the Confederation of the Cinque Ports which formed in the 11th century when together with Sandwich, Dover, and Hastings they combined for mutual support, The obligation of the ports was to supply ships and men to the King once a year. Folkestone and Lydd became “limbs” of the Cinque Ports in later years
- Tudor Kings and Queens took a particular interest in the area and Henry VIII built Sandgate Castle as a defence against the French in 1539 while Queen Elizabeth visited it in 1573
- During the Napoleonic Wars the district played a vital role in the defence of the realm with the establishment of major camps at Folkestone and Hythe, the building of the 28 mile Royal Military Canal, redoubts at Dymchurch and Lade and the construction of a chain of Martello Towns which start in Folkestone and continue along the coast to Sussex
- The opening of the railway line from London in 1843 brought fame and fortune to Folkestone and its neighbouring coastal towns. Ten years later, the main line was connected to the harbour and train services were able to connect with boat sailings via a viaduct which sweeps high over the east of the town to make a highly visible landmark
- Fine hotels were built to attract and accommodate the famous and the fashionable, who stayed to enjoy lively social seasons or to break their journeys en route for grand tours of the Continent
- During World War I Folkestone became one of the most important military centres in Britain with the harbour being a major embarkation port and areas such as the Leas being used for rest camps
- During the Second World War, Folkestone again became a town of considerable military importance, and a target for bombing and shelling
- Shepway has been home to many writers including Charles Dickens, Oscar Wilde, H G Wells, Agathie Christie, E Nesbit and Russell Thorndike
- Famous scientists have included William Harvey, discoverer of the circulation of blood, Sir Francis Pettitt (screw propeller) and Lionel Lukin (self-righting lifeboat); and wireless pioneer John Logie Baird

- After a history of failed proposals and attempts going back over almost 200 years in 1994 the 31 miles long Channel Tunnel, which has the longest undersea portion of any tunnel in the world, opened with its UK terminal at Cheriton

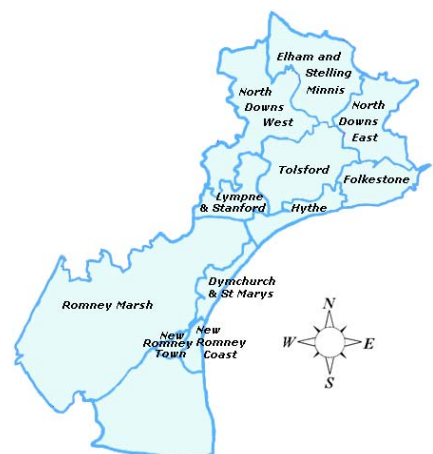
Shepway's Downlands

North of Folkestone and Hythe rolling downs and woodland around villages like Elham, Stelling Minnis, Stowting, Elmsted and Bodsham make up a major part of the nationally important Kent Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty – see

On the eastern edge of of Folkestone the chalk cliffs meet the sea at Folkestone Warren a major wildlife site and the beginning of the Folkestone-Dover Heritage Coast.

An unhurried visit to the Romney Marsh, where a hundred square miles of countryside roll down from the hills to meet broad sands and shingle beaches, is a must for everyone who enjoys peace and quiet. Here are isolated churches from medieval times. Miles of winding lanes, quiet and level with long views across unspoilt countryside, make walking and cycling a real pleasure. Centuries-old village inns offer a warm welcome - and tales of local legend and history, too. Some people describe the Marsh as wild and desolate - 'the sixth continent'.



Beaches

Shepway has 23 miles of coastline most of which is accessible, with a variety of sandy and shingle, quiet and lively beaches.

The main beaches include:-

Folkestone

- Lower Leas Coastal Park. The Green Flag winning park provides large sheltered bays for swimming, a sandpit and other places for children to play, including an exciting adventure playground - the largest in the south east.
- Sunny Sands – MCS 2009 recommended a highly popular sandy beach at the eastern end of the Stade and Folkestone Harbour with good facilities nearby including WCs and cafés, pubs and beach shops
- Folkestone Warren – part of the Folkestone to Dover Heritage Coastline and Kent Downs AONB this quiet sandy beach with rock pools, fossils and part of the East Cliff & Warren Country Park and Local Nature Reserve – often a venue for walks and talks led by the White Cliffs Countryside Project

The route passes through the beautiful village of Saltwood and offers the chance to admire the village's impressive church. There is also the opportunity to enjoy fantastic views of the surrounding countryside and the historic Saltwood Castle.
- **Tolsford Trek** explores the coastal countryside on a 7.8 mile route, starting from Brockhill Country Park. The walk starts with a climb to the top of Tolsford Hill, an impressive

natural feature that remains wild and unspoilt. The route boasts magnificent views and travels through chalk grassland before returning to the park.

Elham Walk is a circular route (3 miles) starting from Elham's medieval church and climbs into open fields offering stunning views across the valley. The well marked paths wind through pasture and chalk grassland before gradually descending back towards the village. Tourism Figures: Key headline figures for Shepway for 2006

- It is estimated that around 420,159 overnight tourism staying trips were made to Shepway in 2006. Of these trips, domestic visitors made 88% of trips (371,642) and overseas visitors made 12% of trips (48,517). Of those staying trips £66,735,385 spent by staying visitors.
- It is estimated that around 3.3 million tourism day trips were made to Shepway in 2006, generating a further £101,296,063 trip expenditure.
- In total £168,031,448 was spent by all visitors on their trip. In addition, expenditure by friends and relatives on visitors, and visitors spend on second homes (i.e. maintenance) generates a further £8,454,000. With the addition of other expenditure tourism activity generated £176,485,448 expenditure.
- Of this expenditure, £164,578,000 translates into direct income for local business; and a further £32,915,600 of income is generated through indirect and induced effects (a total of £197,493,600 business turnover).
- This income supported 2,844 FTE jobs and 3,890 Actual jobs. Overall it is estimated that tourism expenditure supported 6% of local employment.
